St John Henry Newman...

Last weekend, in Rome, Pope Francis made John Henry Newman a saint. Newman is widely considered to be one of the most significant figures of the 19th century. This canonisation is the conclusion of his *cause* to sainthood. His *cause* was opened in 1958, he was declared Venerable by Pope Saint John Paul II in 1991 and Pope Benedict XVI declared him Blessed, in Cofton Park near Birmingham, as the culmination of his visit to the UK in September 2010. At that Mass Pope Benedict said that Newman: *tells us that our divine Master has assigned a specific task to each one of us, a 'definite service', committed uniquely to every single person... The definite service to which Blessed John Henry was called, involved applying his keen intellect and his prolific pen to many of the most pressing 'subjects of the day'. His insights into the relationship between faith and reason, into the vital place of revealed religion in civilised society, and into the need for a broadly-based and wide-ranging approach to education were not only of profound importance for Victorian England, but continue today to inspire and enlighten many all over the world.* We pray that St John Henry's prayers will help each of us discern our *definite service* that we may continue in our desire to serve the Lord each day. (St John Henry's feast day is 9th October) **...pray for us!**

Mgr Roderick Strange will give a talk at St Mary's Church Hall in Morecambe on the evening of 5 November at 7pm on St John Henry Newman. This is an open event for the Deanery, and all are welcome. Mgr Strange is former rector of the Pontifical Beda College and has now been appointed as Professor in Theology at St Mary's University, Twickenham. He is also a member of the Theology Faculty at the University of Oxford.

Let us pray...

The Amalekites challenged the Hebrews to a decisive battle. Moses watched from a distance. His brother Aaron and his companion, Hur, stayed with Moses. As long as Moses arms were raised holding his staff - the power of God - the Israelites were winning; when his arms came down, the Amalekites were winning. The position of his raised up arms is an ancient one of prayer. As Moses remained united to God in prayer, God's power prevailed. He couldn't do it alone; he needed the support of others; even with help, it took all Moses had to persevere. The gospel also, humorously, demonstrates perseverance in prayer. Nobody could tell the unjust judge what to do until he meets this widow, she wouldn't give it a rest! She knew she was right; she wanted justice. She badgered him night and day. The widow kept pestering the judge for a just decision. Moses kept his arms raised in prayer until the Israelites won. Jesus says the most important thing about prayer is to *pray continually*. So let us keep raising our arms to God in prayer, and keep pestering God. He always listens and always loves us. **...Keep trying, don't give up**
