Green - Annual Mass Count

- Whilst we are taking our utmost care to ensure that our buildings are Covid-safe, 'vulnerable'
 parishioners are asked to think carefully, particularly as cases increase nationally, before
 attending Holy Mass.
- We are severely restricting numbers in the church buildings, to ensure social distancing, and
 everyone will be required to sanitise their hands on entry and to keep the nose and mouth
 covered whilst in the building [unless medical conditions prevent you from doing so].
- We will also take a contact number for all attendees. These details will be destroyed after 21 days according to data management regulations.
- The churches are cleaned using a 'fogging' system after each celebration of Holy Mass, if you
 are visiting for private prayer before the Blessed Sacrament at St. Mary's Hornby please clean
 your space using wipes after use.

Reflecting on the Word of God

The Two Sons

This Gospel scene takes place in the Temple of Jerusalem. Jesus was there teaching the people when some chief priests and elders interrupted Him and asked Him who had given Him authority to do this (cf. Mt 21:23-27). These men thought they were the only ones qualified to teach the people God's law, as authentic interpreters of the divine will and guides for

Jesus answers them with a parable whose topic has a long tradition in Israel: the different reactions of two brothers when confronted with the same situation. The narratives about Cain and Abel, Ismael and Isaac, Esau and Jacob were well known by those men. In this case, one of the brothers says he wants to obey his father's will—like those men now confronting Jesus—but he fails to do it. The other brother states publicly his rejection of what his father has asked them to do—like any sinner who acts against the divine law—but later changes his mind and repents, and he does what his father asked.

Then as also now, there are many people who don't want to reject God, but whose reply to the divine requirements is so reluctant that, when faced with the slightest difficulty, they fail to do what they should and even think they are excused from doing it. The practice of their religion is so routine that it doesn't bother them at all to set aside what God considers most important.

Jesus' words are an invitation to react. "We have to remember and remind people around us," Saint Josemaria says, "that we are children of God, who have received the same invitation from our Father as the two brothers in the parable: 'Son, go and work in my vineyard.' I give you my word that if we make a daily effort to see our personal duties in this light, that is, as a divine summons, we will learn to carry them through to completion with the greatest human and supernatural perfection of which we are capable. Occasionally we may rebel, like the elder of the two sons, who replied to his father, 'I will not,' but we will learn how to turn back repentant and redouble our efforts to do our duty."

redouble our efforts to do our duty." Jesus knows the human heart very well, and understands the difficulties and tensions we are all confronted with each day, both interiorly-the struggle to overcome laziness and reluctance—as well as in the environment around us-giving more importance to what others do, rather than doing what we know we should even when others fail to do it. As Pope Francis said, mentioning this Gospel scene among others: "Jesus knows the anxieties and tensions experienced by families and he weaves them into his parables: children who leave home to seek adventure (cf. Lk 15:11-32), or who prove troublesome (cf. Mt 21:28-31) or fall prey to violence (cf. Mk 12:1-9)."[2] God is well aware of our difficulties, but He patiently waits for us to rectify and for our generous reply like that of the rebellious son. The end of the parable contains some pointed words: "Truly, I say to you, the tax collectors and the harlots go into the kingdom of God before you" (v. 31). That is, those who suffer because of their sins and sincerely desire a pure heart are nearer the

Lord, inspire me to read your Scriptures and to meditate upon them day and night. I beg you to give me real understanding of what I need, that I in turn may put its precepts into practice. Yet, I know that understanding and good intentions are worthless, unless rooted in your graceful love. So I ask that the words of Scripture may also be not just signs on a page, but channels of grace into my heart. Amen.

New NHS Test and Trace App

On the 24th September, the NHS began to roll-out its new Test & Trace phone app, which is for use on smartphones (with Bluetooth enabled). When you arrive at a venue you simply scan the Q.R. code near the entrance to record your attendance. If a notification is subsequently sent to an app user, it will not mention the name of the particular venue, just that the user has recently been to a place where they spent fifteen minutes or more, close to someone who has subsequently tested positive for coronavirus. Details of the privacy safeguards used are readily available on the internet. If you do not check-in with your phone at church, you will still need to do a manual check-in (i.e. name on a list).

Unique Q.R. Codes are present at the entrance to each church. We will however continue to register attendees in our churches.

Those who read on Saturday or Sunday

Readers are asked to wear face-masks as they approach the Lectern which should then be removed for reading and replaced for returning to their places. Gloves should also be worn at the lectern. Gloves for this purpose can be found at the entrance to both churches.

The manner for receiving Holy Communion

The Bishops' Guidance requests that those receiving Holy Communion on the hand should stretch as far as they can to maintain social distancing during the distribution of Holy Communion. Please remove your mask just before receiving Holy Communion and try to keep the hand receiving our Blessed Lord as flat as possible with no fingers in the air.

The Bishops request the presence of a 'barrier'. This will be the sanctuary steps: please stand as close to them as possible and 'reach out'...

We do not want to turn families away from Masses over the Christmas period due to our limited capacity. We therefore intend to create a 'pop up' church for Christmas - a large marquee with flooring, heating and lighting in the garden of St. Mary to enable a worthy celebration of the Solemnity of the Incarnation and help bring a bit of light in this difficult situation. This will have the capacity to accommodate the numbers usually present at Christmas Masses.

What's the catch? There will be a cost for this - around £1600. If you would like to help cover the costs you are welcome to contribute. Place any donations in an envelope marked 'Christmas Church'. Any donations above the cost will go to 'Mary's Meals'.
