- Public worship has ceased in the parishes on Thursday 5th November and hopefully resume on Wednesday 2nd December. A streamed Mass without Congregation on Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday will be available via zoom using the link on the parish website.
- St. Mary's Hornby will be open for individual prayer at times listed above. Due to guidelines issued by the Bishops' Conference unlimited access is not permitted but access is only possible while stewards are present. If parishioners are willing to come forward to steward then the church will be open at additional times the guidelines of the Catholic Church are stricter than our Anglican neighbours unfortunately. The capacity at Hornby is 16 individuals at any one time. Benches have been arranged to facilitate this.

The Gospel reading for this feast is very rich. It invites us to reflect on the difference between true love and its false imitation, between real Christianity and its fake lookalike. It encourages us to exercise ourselves in the care of all God's children. It prompts us to reflect on all the different kinds of hunger there are in the world, and the very different kinds of feeding those various hungers require.

These are all good things to ponder, but there is still more to see. Here is one more thing.

Think about what it is for God himself to be incarnate. A human woman took the Lord to her breast and suckled him there. The apostle John reclined by the Lord and laid his head on the bosom of the Lord. A woman washed the Lord's feet with her tears, and a woman rubbed his feet with lotion. How did those people get so lucky? Of all the millions and millions of God's people, how can it be that so few touched God in the flesh, that only one woman anointed his feet? Wouldn't you have liked to be among these very lucky people? In desperately sad and stricken moments, what wouldn't you yourself have given to lay your weary head on the breast of your Lord?

It is good to have a God who enters human history, but anything in history is local, constrained in time and space, cut off from so many things that aren't right here, right now. How can it be that only those few people, who were there with Jesus, in that place and at that time, had contact with the Lord flesh to flesh?

The answer to this question and the consolation the question seeks is in the Gospel reading: whatever you did to one of the least of my own, the Lord says, you did it to me..

Christ the King and Youth Sunday.

It was Pope Pius XI who instituted the Feast of Christ the King in 1925. He could see the rise of fascist regimes in Europe and the threats emanating from Bolshevik Russia. What these regimes had in common was secularism and extreme nationalism which was atheistic, denied the law of God, and asserted complete dominion over the lives of its citizens. Such regimes are not unknown in today's world. Where objective standards of right or wrong are sidelined, and justice is trampled on, the human race is in trouble. Christ alone can command our complete allegiance, and those who live by His truth and teachings find peace themselves and spread peace in society. Young people have a pivotal role in all of this. Youth is a time of idealism when 'the sky is the limit'. Obviously, as well as vision, practical skills are also needed to make the ideal become reality. Young people have the physical and spiritual energy to do this. We pray for them that they may use the precious gift of freedom, well; to build up rather than destroy; to plant rather than uproot. What can we do in our parishes to help young people realise this vocation and see that Christianity is not an outmoded way of thought, life and values, but rather is the way forward for humanity? You will have noticed that Pope Francis is trying to address some of these world issues and encouraging young people to live and practice their faith to the full. Reaching out to the young is not easy, but we have to find imaginative ways to do this. In the last 100 years there have been more martyrs than in the previous 19 centuries; men and women, many of them young, who would not submit to evil. May they be our inspiration! Christus vincit, Christus regnat, Christus imperat!
