Covid-19 Guidance

- The obligation to assist at Holy Mass is still lifted as is the requirement to abstain from meat on Fridays.
- Whilst we are taking our utmost care to ensure that our buildings are Covid-safe, 'vulnerable'
 parishioners are asked to think carefully before attending Holy Mass. Although Lancashire is in
 Tier 3 our area currently has a relatively low rate of infection.
- We are severely restricting numbers in the church buildings, to ensure social distancing, and
 everyone is required to sanitise their hands on entry and to keep the nose and mouth covered
 whilst in the building [unless medical conditions prevent you from doing so].
- We will also take contact details of those attending to enable Track and Trace procedures. NHS
 Track and Trace app scanning codes are available in all churches. These details will be
 destroyed after 21 days according to data management regulations.
- The churches are cleaned using a 'fogging' system after each celebration of Holy Mass, if you are visiting for private prayer before the Blessed Sacrament at St. Mary's Hornby please clean your space using wipes after use.

Reflecting on the Word of God

Peace, Consolation, and Glory

In the Gospel Reading, Simeon is waiting in the Temple, because the Holy Spirit has revealed to him that he will meet the Messiah there. When Simeon does finally see Jesus, the Gospel tells us, Simeon had been waiting for a long time.

Waiting can be so hard. Think of the young mother waiting for lab results about her cancer, or the old lady waiting for news about her son in Afghanistan. Think of the aspiring novelist waiting to hear if the press will accept his manuscript or the scientist waiting to know if his life's work will be honoured with a great prize. Peace is so often lost by such a wait.

While a person is waiting, he is anxious—what if the thing he is waiting for never comes? And he is sad or sorrowful, because he does not yet have the thing he wants and is waiting for. Then there's the undeniable humiliation of having to wait. A person who waits knows that what he wants depends on things outside his own control. Having to wait brings home to him his vulnerability and neediness.

And so look at what Simeon says when his wait is finally over and he sees Jesus.

Seeing this baby, Simeon says, lets me die in peace. This baby overturns anxiety and brings peace—not a theoretical kind of peace which has no purchase on a person's emotions, but real peace, the kind that brings with it easy breathing. And why peace? Because, as the Holy Spirit revealed to Simeon, this baby is God's consolation for all his people. If God himself gives a person consolation, he will have God's peace as well.

And, finally, this peace is not the kind of peace that makes a person ready with resignation to accept defeat. No, on the contrary: it makes a person rise to glory. That is why Simeon says in his prayer that this baby brings glory to God's people.

And so here is the thing for us to think about at Christmas. In our anxieties, in our sorrows, in our defeats and humiliations, can we turn and look at this baby? No matter what anxiety, sorrow, or defeat the world has given us, nothing can take this baby away from us. Our consolation, our peace, and our glory lie with him.

Pastoral Letter

As is the custom, the pastoral letter from the Bishop of Lancaster for the Feast of the Holy Family will be read at Masses this weekend - his 'gift' to the priests of the diocese.

Christmas and Holy Family Offering

From Bishop Paul Swarbrick 'Because of COVID 19 restrictions, the numbers attending our Christmas Masses will inevitably be considerably less than under normal circumstances. This will have an impact on the Christmas Offerings received at the Vigil Masses and Masses on Christmas Day. Many priests rely on the Christmas Offerings as a key part of their annual income. To lessen the impact that reduced numbers at Mass will have on Christmas Offerings the following will apply for this year: Priests may take the offerings on Christmas Day and the Sunday following Christmas as their Christmas Offerings, plus any standing orders that the parish receives that weekend.'

Fr Michael passes the offering onto the parish to contribute towards his monthly stipend, also any offerings received from Mass intentions and stole fees for weddings, baptisms and funerals. Any gifts received in cards etc are retained.

Crib Offering

It is customary to leave an offering when visiting the crib in our churches. Bishop Paul has asked that any monies raised through the crib offering are sent to help the growing number of needy families in and around Bethlehem, supported by Friends of the Holy Land, who have been especially hit by the loss of all their income

White Flower Collection

Our Lady's Sixth Form Uganda Action Group

I would like to thank all the parishioners who bought items or donated towards our Christmas Fund Raiser and a special thanks to Elda for all her masks and stockings! Incredibly, alongside funds raised in school, we have raised more than £1000 for the Home of Divine Mercy which we visited in 2018. They are building a dormitory so the girls do not have to walk a long distance to school each day. This is a message they have sent to thank you for your generosity.

'We roofed the dormitory with the help of professor Pulice of Regis University in the USA. He has promised to look for some assistance to put some doors and windows on the dormitory. With your assistance of £1000 we propose that we buy beds and mattresses to host at least 25 most vulnerable girls who are currently living in a poor situation. Due to the urgency of keeping the girls in a safe environment, we can begin using the dormitory before we plaster it and put down the floor. We shall keep pouring water to minimise dust. Safety of life of girls comes first as we gradually improve their dormitory standards. Again, allow me to say THANKS A LOT AND BE BLESSED. AM SHORT OF WORDS. Fr.
