Covid-19 Guidance - UPDATED

- The parish is now operating within the NATIONAL LOCKDOWN. Public worship is permissible
 within lockdown BUT THOSE WHO ARE CONSIDERED VULNERABLE or who HAVE BEEN
 ASKED TO SHIELD are advised to assist at Holy Mass online and not to attend in person.
 There is still no obligation to attend Mass in person.
- For those who have been vaccinated please remember that this does not provide immunity
 from the COVID Virus but in the majority of cases does prevent severe symptoms developing.
- You must **wear a mask** if attending Holy Mass. You must observe **social distancing** [including when you approach to receive Holy Communion]. You must **sanitise your hands** when entering the church. Failure to observe these things may lead to suspending public Mass.
- We are restricting numbers in the church buildings: Caton has a capacity of 30. Hornby 24.
 Kirkby Lonsdale 29 [the St. Josephs room will no longer be used as an overspill]. The Mass with the lowest attendance at the moment is the 6.00 pm Vigil Mass at Caton [around 12/13].
- We will take contact details of those attending to enable Track and Trace procedures. NHS
 Track and Trace app scanning codes are available in all churches. These details will be
 destroyed after 21 days according to data management regulations.
- The churches are cleaned using a 'fogging' system after each celebration of Holy Mass, if you
 are visiting for private prayer before the Blessed Sacrament at St. Mary's Hornby please clean
 your space using wipes after use.
- PLEASE NOTE: The current levels per 100,000 are Hornby 142, Caton 282, Kirkby Lonsdale
 Suppressed [fewer than 3 cases] below or well below the national average. If levels are
 significantly above the national average then, for the interests of safety, the public celebration of
 Mass may be temporarily suspended.
- Holy Mass will be celebrated with dignity but without the Second Reading, Gloria or Creed.

Reflecting on the Word of God

Serving the Lord Well

In the Gospel Reading, when Jesus comes to Peter's house, he

finds that Peter's mother-in-law is sick, and he heals her.

And then look what happens. The whole town hears of her healing and they rush all their sick to Peter's house. The house is surrounded, and so is Jesus. Now, all of a sudden, Jesus seems to have become a one-man hospital.

He is so besieged that he can't even pray in the house. He has to head out secretly into the countryside in the dark of early morning.

When his absence is detected, his disciples go looking for him. "Hey," they say when they find him, "Everybody is looking for you"! They seem to think that his urgent-care clinic should be open at all hours.

Now, of course, it is a good work to heal the sick. And, of course, those who love the sick are right to want them healed.

And yet how absurd it is to suppose that prayer should take second-place to work, no matter what the work is! And how sadly and understandably absurd it is to suppose that the mission of Jesus is to be a Doctor Without Borders.

So maybe it isn't hard to figure out what Jesus was praying about in the early morning in the countryside.

Each healing Jesus does is a good thing. But good things can actually get in the way of serving God well. To serve God well, a person has to do not just any good things that others want him to do. He has to do those good things that God has called him to do. It may take prayer to figure out which good things to turn down.

Jesus' disciples feel that Jesus needs to hurry back to Peter's village to keep practicing medicine. What Jesus tells them, after his prayer, is that he is leaving Peter's village to continue his ministry—not of medicine but of preaching—in other towns. Preaching is the purpose for which he came.

What is needed to serve God well, then, is not endless good things that other people want from you. What is needed for the Lord's service is prayer first. And after that comes fidelity to just those few good things that fulfil that particular purpose to which the Lord has called you.

Canonical Merger of the Parish of St. Mary Hornby with St. Joseph Kirkby Lonsdale - consultation.

At the beginning of Lent Fr. Michael will begin a formal process of canonical consultation with parishioners on 'canonically' merging the two existing parishes. The impact of this will largely be to reduce the amount of bureaucracy that currently exists. More details to follow.

Devotions during Lent

During Lent, Fr Michael will offer a couple of spiritual devotions each week. On Monday evenings at 7.00 pm he will offer a spiritual reflection on the scriptures for the following Sunday. This will be followed by discussion. On Fridays at 12.30 pm he will lead Stations of the Cross using a series of different meditations [some traditional, some modern]. Both of these will be offered via Zoom on the Parish Website.

When the weather picks up it is hoped to have outdoor stations in the garden at Hornby... here's to a warmer Spring.

St. Mary Hornby 1821-2021

This year marks the bicentenary of the church of St. Mary in Hornby which will hopefully be marked in a special way [d.v.] on the solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary in August 2021. This being the patronal feast of the church.

As part of this bicentenary year we will be taking stock, not only to recognise the historical presence of the Catholic community in Hornby (especially the contribution of that great Catholic woman Anne Fenwick) but also to secure the future presence of the Catholic community in the Lune Valley, especially in light of the current situation.

Some may say that buildings don't matter but the truth is that we gather in, celebrate our faith in, worship Almighty God in and are shaped in buildings which we have received from those who have preceded us. We are only here because of what those who have gone before us have given us.

There is a duty placed upon us that we maintain and build upon that which we have received for the generations that will come after us.

In consultation with the Diocesan Property Office we have appointed a conservation architect to begin the initial process of providing a quinquennial survey of the site at St. Mary Hornby. This will take place during the week beginning 8th February and be conducted by Robert Harrington, an experienced conservation architect with a special interest in Georgian architecture. This will determine priorities for necessary works and to update the facilities in Hornby for the 'good of the mission'.

As the process unfolds there will be regular updates of progress and opportunities for conversation, even if only virtual, as the year progresses.

Pray for the success of this work - especially as we prepare grant submissions to various organisations during the year.

It is well worth a read. Ash Wednesday

The guidance from the Vatican for the imposition of Ashes is slightly different from what we would be used to. Whereas the English custom is to smear ashes on the forehead, this year we will be adopting the guidelines from the Vatican where the dry ashes are sprinkled on the crown of the head. As with the distribution of Holy Communion, the call to repentance will be made only once prior to the imposition of ashes.

There will be two celebrations of Holy Mass on Ash Wednesday. 12.00 noon at Kirkby Lonsdale and 6.00 pm at Caton to allow parishioners to begin their Lenten journey well. Fr Michael will take Tuesday 16th as his rest day so there will be no evening Mass at Caton that evening, but a morning Mass at Hornby.
