Covid-19 Guidance

- Instructions are as given in previous weeks please refer to those via the parish website.
- Those who have been vaccinated may want to consider returning back to Holy Mass, even if only to one of the weekday Masses.
- We are restricting numbers in the church buildings: Caton has a capacity of 30. Hornby 24. Kirkby Lonsdale 29. The Sunday Mass with the lowest attendance at the moment is the 6.00 pm Vigil Mass.
- We will take contact details of those attending to enable Track and Trace procedures. NHS Track and Trace app scanning codes are available in all churches. These details will be destroyed after 21 days according to data management regulations.
- The churches are cleaned using a 'fogging' system after each celebration of Holy Mass, if you
 are visiting for private prayer before the Blessed Sacrament at St. Mary's Hornby please clean
 your space using wipes after use.
- PLEASE NOTE: For all areas of the parish numbers are now all classed as 'suppressed' indicating that there are fewer than 3 cases in each area.

Reflecting on the Word of God

True joy

The Psalm for Easter Sunday says, "This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it." Above

But what is joy? The answer St. Francis gave to this question is famous. St. Francis said to his Brother Leo, "When we come to [our house] St. Mary of the Angels, soaked by the rain and frozen by the cold, all soiled with mud and suffering from hunger, and we ring at the gate of the place and the brother porter comes and says angrily: "Who are you?' And we say: 'We are two of your brothers.' And ... he does not open for us, but makes us stand outside in the snow and rain, cold and hungry, until night falls—then if we endure all those insults and cruel rebuffs patiently, ... oh, Brother Leo, ... perfect joy is there!"

Whatever we may think of St. Francis's explanation of perfect joy, Easter reminds us that Francis's kind of joy is not the end of the story. At Easter, we celebrate the other kind of joy, the kind each of us longs for, when every tear is wiped away, and there is no sorrow anymoreno more suffering from weather or hunger or hurtful human beings. In the hymn by Fr. John Foley, S. J. at Easter "the cross and passion past, dark night is over, bright morning comes at last!" When we ourselves rise to meet our risen Lord, in that bright morning we will hear him say, "Come away, beloved. The winter is past; the rain is gone, and the flowers return to the earth." (Song of Songs 2:10-12) In the loving union of that encounter, all the heartbrokenness of our lives will be redeemed. That will be perfect iov.

If all we had was the joy St. Francis describes, our courage might fail us in this life. Easter celebrates now the perfect joy waiting for us when we and all creation are reborn with our resurrected Lord into the everlasting love of God. This is the day that the Lord has made. Let us rejoice and be glad in it.

St. Mary's Garden

With the lifting of certain Covid restrictions [especially concerning groups of 6 or 2 households meeting in gardens], from the 12th April the garden will be able to welcome visitors. Initially this will be limited to Sundays between 12.00 noon and 5.00 p.m [18th April being the first Sunday for this]. Persons entering do so at their own risk. A risk assessment covering access to this garden is available on the parish website.

Covid - changes over coming months

12th April: Weddings 15. Funerals 30.Sacramental preparation can take place. 17th May: Weddings 30. Baptisms permitted. From the 21st June 'it is hoped all legal limits on social contact can be removed'.

First Holy Communion this year is likely to take place over the weekend of Sunday 27th June 2021. Application forms for both sacraments will be available shortly on the parish website with any classes for First Holy Communion taking place after the 12th April.

Climate Change Conference

The British Government is hosting the United Nations Climate Change Conference in November this year in Glasgow. The hope is that when the governments of the world come together they will be able to build on the agreement reached in Paris in 2015. Although we are still living through the current pandemic, the Pope has pointed out that this is actually just one of the 'pandemics' that affect our world at the moment; human trafficking, corruption, hunger, but also climate change which affects all of these.

The experience of Paris showed that governments are encouraged to take this matter seriously when they hear expressions of concern from the public.

I am conscious that personal opinions regarding global climate change differ. Our parishes should not be operating as political pressure groups, however, the care of and concern for the environment is something we should all take more seriously. The Glasgow conference COP26 is an event of world significance challenging the way the world does business. It opens the door for all of us to live in a way that is less demanding on Creation and more sympathetic to becoming a global citizen. There is much to reflect on. Fr.
